Following the program introduction, a welcome remark was delivered by Dr. Melesse Mariyo, Director General, Ethiopian Biodiversity Institute (EBI).

Dr. Melesse Mariyo, thanked and acknowledge all participants for their coming to attend this workshop and the organizers of the workshop.

An opening speech was made by H.E. Solomon Late, Head of the Agricultural Affairs standing Committee of House of peoples Representative. In his speech, his excellency Solomon Dale emphasized the issues of biodiversity that Ethiopian is endowed with and the current scenarios that biological diversity and ecosystem have facing worldwide. Even though, Ethiopian is known to have huge biodiversity resources, climate change, unwise utilization of the natural resources leading to the destruction of the natural habitat have resulted in decline in a number of biological diversity, and ecosystem services.

Further, he pointed out that the Government of Ethiopia, as its strong commitment, has put in place different initiatives to mitigate the impact of climate change and safeguard biodiversity. Green Legacy Initiative, among others, is a typical exemplary undertaking, as part of the Climate Resilience Green Growth (CRGE) where billions of seedlings have been planted each year across the country.

H.E. Solomon acknowledge the Ethiopian Biodiversity Institute for the role it has played so far in taking the leading role, as its mandate, in implementing the CBD targets and safeguarding the country's biological diversity as well as organizing this workshop. He further delivered his strong message emphasizing on the need to bring and strengthen the cooperation and synergy among stakeholders in safeguarding the biodiversity and associated knowledge in this climate changing scenarios which the globe has been facing.

He highlighted the major outputs that the National Biodiversity Platform has undertaken since its establishment in 2022, in particular strategic issues related to biodiversity and ecosystem services in Ethiopia.











Finally, having addressed the objective of the workshop, and acknowledging all participants and the organizers, H.E Solomon Dale officially opened the day- workshop.

Following the opening speech, different outreach materials and policy brief were presented consecutively,

After the presentation of the outreach and policy brief materials, consecutive presentations were held by Dr Melesse Maryo and Dr Feleke Woldeyes

The first presentation was given by Dr Melesee, regarding the NBSAP, while Dr. Feleke held a presentation entitled. EPBES Assessments Uptake, the Nexus Assessment, was briefly presented by Dr. Feleke Woldeyes. In his presentation, Dr. Feleke addressed the issue of EPBES concept and historical establishment, achievements of the EPBES, and the three objectives of IPBES. As to Dr. Feleke presentation

In summarizing the session held so far, HE remained the past commitment and expect to present the status of the assignment taken thereof.

Having said so, HE gave the chance for the participants to raise their reflection n the

Accordingly:

1. Seifudin from Oromia EPA

- The issue related to wet land is an important issue raised here, protecting the buffer zone of the wet land should attain due consideration and worked on critically,
- Carbon sink issues is not well addressed in the presentation,
- Working on honey bee and honey production related undertaking attract attention on which
 we are working vigorously,











- We need to safeguard our biodiversity before it went out,
- Structural alignment, which said to be a gap in addressing report of the biodiversity related undertaking.

2. From South Region-representative

- Collaboration and commitment from all sides is important,
- The earth is recently getting degraded at an alarming rate, which calls for urgent action,
- To restore the degraded area we need to have a commitment,
- We are working vigorously eg. Restoration of mountain areas with the initiative from the regional government president,
- Wet lands are being converted due to agricultural practices
- Reporting gap is becoming an urgent issue to be resolved

3. From Parliamentary

Ayisha (Trade standing committee)

- The commitment that EBI has played should be acknowledged in addressing the issue of biodiversity,
- We have started considering policy issue in relation to BD before it gets approved,
- The undertakings by the Industries have also been under our supervision whether or not their activities pollute the environment,

From planning and finance standing committee- Desalegn

- While we evaluating the performance of Institutions/organization, we strictly considering their achievements against the issue of Bd,
- We managed to approved a green legacy fund in line with safeguarding BD and mitigating the impacts of climate change
- International agreements shall be countries legal frame, so we need to bring these agreements into practices

From Research Institutions











Dr Girma from Policy study Institute

- Our institute has been working to contribute towards the issues of Bd to bring the issues of BD into front line in each sector
- We have participated in other policy -related studies of the Institute.

Aben yimer from Fishery

- We have conducted a lot of research related to aquatic and wet land ecosystem
- We do not have institution alignment with EBI, which need further consideration.

From Universities

Dr. Anteneh---- from Haronaya University

- The issues of considering the Bd and ecosystem issues as an audit finding get recognition from the Standing committee is appreciable,
- We have been working on lake Haromaya and Adelle Lake and bring these lake ecosystems to its restored status, being forced by the committee, but lack of land use policy is becoming a challenge

Demamo Mesfin from Bahir Dar University

- Even if we are thriving to reduce the loss of BD, still we could not manage to halt the same, so we need to work a lot,
- The existing policies are not well practiced due to mainly inability to reach the ground root for practice,
- Institutional arrangements are instability and not well staffed, not well organized at lower level
- Horizontal and vertical alignment of institutions need to be revised,
- Lake Tana need attention in the current scenario of expanding agricultural pratices,
- Church forestry, which can be a seed sources, can be registered as UNESCO resources











Permanent Focal person for BD need to be in place for BD-related issues

Dr. Debissa from AU

- We are building capacity in areas of natural resources and BD related disciplines
- Information dispatch via Media regarding BD
- Central national data need to be in place on BD related information
- The issue of PES and biosphere reserve as policy frameworks are not yet approved, lagging, why should these frame work are not yet approved?

Federal GO

Ethiopian Wildlife Conservation Authority

- We are working with EBI in collaboration
- The Issues of BD is not a one=sector undertaking, need to synergies our efforts
- Monitoring and evaluation, well established and aligned to the down root
- Resources mobilization need to be gain due attention
- Experience sharing important

Ato Solomon from MELCA

EBI has gained experience in working corroborate with NGOs as an e.g.

- Nomination of anyway BR
- BR draft policy frame works

- We need to take the issue to our institution in addressing the achievements of the NBP

- Focal person for biodiversity-related issues needs to be assigned by each member institutes
- Awareness creation- Universities, media, standing committee and research Institutes need to engage in awareness creation undertakings
- Green legacy initiatives we need to foster on and strengthen the green legacy initiative
- Protect our forests
- Restore degraded areas
- Protect environmental pollution











- Support biodiversity related issues
- We need ti come up with achievement reports for the up-coming meeting focusing on the aforementioned activities
